

#### Dear Friends,

For food and drink and fellowship, God's Holy name be praised.

One of my greatest pleasures is sitting down to a meal with my family. At home, we try to eat as a family on a Sunday, where we can chat about the week past and about what is coming up. It is a time of joy and love. Many surveys show that families who eat together are emotionally stable and have a sense of well – being. Sharing a meal with friends is also much enjoyed – relationships can be reestablished and deepened.

In Christianity, eating together is considered a deeply significant act, symbolising unity, fellowship, love, and God's provision. The tradition of people eating together being a sign of God's reign or kingdom is rooted in Judaeo-Christian history.

'On this mountain the Lord of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well-matured wines, of rich food filled with marrow, of well-matured wines strained clear.'

#### NEWS FROM SAPPERTON AND FRAMPTON MANSELL

#### A PERSONAL POINT OF VIEW

When people speak of freedom, they often refer to birds in flight. Think of the swallows in their annual migration who will soon be returning to our villages. They fly thousands of miles unrestricted across many countries whose boundaries are all political constructs devised by man. Yet man persists in fighting and going to war over these notional boundaries.

Wars arise in the minds of men who rarely put their own lives at risk in the conflicts. They are often the consequence of countries' leaders exerting greed for economic or territorial gain, such as trying to control another's natural resources, by using unshackled authoritarian power with an implacable solipsistic belief that only they can be right.

Sadly, today there are more than 40 countries involved in ongoing wars, or war-like conflicts. Heading this list of casualties are the Russian-Ukrainian War, the Israel-Palestine War, the civil wars in Myanmar, Sudan and Ethiopia; the terrorist insurgencies in Nigeria and Cameroon, and the drug wars of Columbia and gang violence in Haiti. It is as though humanity has not learned anything from the horrors of two World Wars. What is more disturbing is that we are witnessing the destruction of the unity of purpose agreed in 1945 when 50 countries (including China, France, the Soviet Union, the United Kingdom, and the United States) ratified the United Nations Charter to maintain international peace and security, give humanitarian assistance to those in need, protect human rights and uphold international law. This, the signatories hoped, would prevent another world war like the one they had just lived through. Decisions made today by some leaders, who have no direct experience of WWII, threaten that unity. Those who fail to recognise history are likely to repeat it.

Never has there been a greater need than now to reassert the importance of international unity for the greater good of humanity. This is not a new plea. It was the message of Jesus as clearly stated by St John, 'That they all may be one' [John 17:21]. What we need to appreciate is that such unity of spirit does not imply a uniformity of practice. Unity of spirit can thrive in the presence of the rich diversity of cultural differences, but it cannot exist where there is greed and selfishness.

The unity of which St John speaks is a mystery. It is the unity of all mankind through union with God. The Dominican theologian Herbert

McCabe, in his seminal book 'God Matters', put it this way; 'The ultimate unity of people is only to be found in God, and the real God is only to be found in unity between people.' [p.78]. The frailty of humanity is the reason for us not having reached that unity, but for our spiritual wellbeing we must continue to aspire to achieve it. So long as we picture God in terms of our class, our nation, our race, we will fail to approach that real unity of spirit which is a brotherhood of all peoples where there is a solidarity with the poor, exploited, and oppressed. The sin of the world is that we have the poor, the exploited, and dispossessed, but all too frequently we choose to do nothing to change it. For spiritual unity to prevail we must, therefore, be wary of those extremists who set out to destroy it for self-gain.

With 21st century technology, the world is as one large room, so let us aim to unite as one large human community with a selfless spirit of unity and reconciliation.

#### SAPPERTON AND FRAMPTON MANSELL PARISH COUNCIL

Parish Council meetings for 2025 will take place on the second Tuesday of each month except August.

At the meeting on 11 March, two members of the public attended to discuss the damage being caused to the canal and the banks of the river Frome by 4x4 drivers and motorbike riders using the byway through the valley from Sapperton and Oakridge through Frampton Mansell to Chalford. The damage caused to the track and surrounding area is extensive in the wet winter months and was the subject of a meeting held in February 2024, instigated by our Ward Councillor Julia Judd on our behalf, who met with the GCC Highways Local Area Manager and representatives from Bathurst Estate, to look at various options for mitigation.

The route is classified as a byway or ORPA, (Other Route with Public Access) and as such vehicles have a legal right to access the track. Stopping them from doing so would involve a Court Order which GCC Highways considered too costly at the time and unlikely to succeed. It was agreed instead, that tree trunks or other obstacles could be placed either side of the track to reduce lateral damage but this has not been entirely successful. Vehicles have been seen doing circuits in privately owned fields. The antisocial behaviour of some of the vehicle owners using the track has led to residents being too fearful to approach them when they deviate from the route, where they become a significant danger to animals and anyone on foot.

We have received some good news from GCC Highways about the flooding occurring on the lane below the Viaduct in Frampton Mansell. We are assured that GCC Highways are currently working on a 'drainage solution ahead of resurfacing'. This has been hard won and achieved only through the persistence of local residents and the parish council submitting photos and registering the issue on 'Fix My Street'. The more residents that flag an issue, the greater the impact and that increases the likelihood of action! Please use it for all road related concerns!

#### NORMAN HOPKINS 1929 - 2025

Norman was born and lived at 25 Rodmarton all his life. A very keen sportsman, he played football and cricket. He was Rodmarton cricket club captain for many years.

He worked on Rodmarton Farms all his working life. He helped to design the grain dryer, which still stands today. He could turn his hand to all manner of things on the farm, from mending equipment to harvesting the crops etc. He was a champion ploughman, winning many championships.

Norman was a keen gardener. He grew vegetables, tomatoes and cucumbers, which he would sell by the garden gate. People would

make a special trip to Rodmarton to buy Norman's tomatoes. Another passion of his was growing chrysanthemums. He won a lot of prizes for them and supplied local flower shops with them.

Along with his wife Betty, Norman ran the local shop in the village. They were also caretakers of the school and village hall. Later in life Norman became very good at woodwork. He made lots of wooden benches and picnic tables, bird tables and even a bed frame.

He also helped with Rodmarton Church; stoking the boiler, ringing the bells, keeping the graveyard records and digging the graves by hand.

#### **GARDENING TIPS FOR APRIL**

At last, we are officially on our Summertime and so thankful for the extra daylight hours, although in reality the next two months are late spring into summer depending on the actual weather that comes our way. April always feels like a busy month for keen gardeners, with seed sowing, under cover or direct, nurturing young plants and planting out as appropriate. Some areas of ground may need preparing.

I was reading a favourite old book recently, (published in 1976) which cautioned April can be a deceptive month weather wise, changing quickly from warm sunshine to heavy rain and emphasised the need for using plenty of frost protection. The balance of these weather conditions has changed to less rain, and frost to warmer temperatures interspersed with very cold winds.

Early sowings made in March can be repeated with successional sowings to extend the harvest time. With experience growing crops you like to eat and your plot grows best become the go-to basics, give these the best areas.

What to sow in April? To sow outside directly or in modules to plant out as small plants, beetroot, carrots, spinach, calabrese, spring onions, coriander, Swiss chard, peas, and half-hardy flowers. Also, sow tender crops to nurture until warmer weather at the end of May, runner beans, tomatoes, courgettes, pumpkins, squash, and cucumbers. There is still time to plant potatoes.

April is known as the hungry gap. Leeks, Kales and Purple Sprouting Broccoli usually come through the winter with good pickings. This year Rainbow Chard and American Land Cress are also available. This is a good month to sow these and other autumn/winter greens, Brussel sprouts, kalette, cabbages and cauliflowers.

This last winter took a toll on grass paths and lawns so loosen soil to repair small areas, barely cover the grass seed with soil, but do protect from pigeons, this may look unsightly while the grass germinates and grows to a reasonable size. It is only for a relatively short time.

During March you may have noticed some daffodils were flowerless or blind; there are several reasons for this. The bulbs may not have been planted deeply enough; they need to be at least 15 cm or deeper to give many years of blooms. Bulbs need to develop for subsequent years with fully functioning leaves. If these are cut off early or mown,

the bulbs will deteriorate and eventually disappear altogether. For good quality flowers feed bulbs in the leaf growing phase.

Look out for charity or specialist plant sales; very often some unusual treasures are offered, small cuttings may need growing on or large chunks planted ASAP. I recently acquired a good-sized rose cutting, repeat flowering in deep pink.

This month we await the twitter of returning House Martins, they usually arrive with noisy chatter and then disappear for a few days to the water park to feed up on insects after there long flight from sub-Saharan Africa. This an astonishing feat for such a tiny bird.

#### **BLOSSOMING TIME**

The first half of March was kind to us, clement in fact. Months of rain had ceased and the land managed to dry up – at long last! – though there are telltale ruts and silted hollows everywhere, which will linger far into summer. For the record, 286mm of rain fell in Culkerton during the three official winter months; it felt more, because it followed on from a preposterous 444mm in Gloucestershire's wettest autumn.

Winter's wannabee empire lay in ruins, its squalidness forgotten. Spring's verdancy and blossom were paramount, birds were singing, and the rookeries were sky-dancing. It was party time, out there in the natural world, the real world, where we spend so little time.

We should celebrate spring far more than we do, taking a lead perhaps from the Japanese, who venerate cherry blossom time – the *Sakura* season – through the ritual of *Hanami*, or blossom watching. The problem is, spring is a variable feast; here one day, AWOL the next, with winter always seeking to twitch again, albeit briefly. Moreover, Nature is becoming more and more something we see and experience through a car windscreen, or through what the dogs see and do on their daily walk. And, of course, Nature is something we must control;



there is no 'balance of nature', that is just us trying to be in control of something that doesn't recognize our agenda.

Meanwhile, the seasons dissolve into each other, and spring dissolves into summer as gold dissolves in aqua regia. Would that spring would tarry longer, as autumn and winter do. It is too transient; blink and you miss it.

Easter this year falls unusually late, so late that the primroses will be all but over in the southwest and all the myriad daffodils in Wales too. There is even a fair chance that the bluebells will be past peak by Easter Day, for after being delayed by a fair number of frosts during January, February and early March (35 frosty nights during those ten weeks here), they are currently romping ahead. I saw my first native bluebell bloom on March 11<sup>th</sup>.

What we all need, farmers and growers especially, is a decent long range weather forecast, accurately

foretelling what lies ahead in the coming weeks. However, our climate is now changing, or fluctuating, so much that it is hard to see beyond the coming week. After last year's annus horribilis, we are due a decent spring and a fair-minded summer. Bring them on!
